Grateful to Immanuel folks for understanding and acceptance:

As most of you know, my husband, Dennis Vail, was diagnosed with dementia and aphasia January 2023. For at least a year before, he noticed that he was forgetting things and becoming confused. Family and close friends noticed that this most positive and kind person had uncharacteristic outbursts of frustration.

His doctors are wonderful, we have a lot of help from family as well as caregivers through a combination of the Illinois Department on Aging and a private elder care provider.

As your pastor, it is important to model self-care and so, as often as possible, I participate in the support group at Smith Village sponsored by the Alzheimer's Association. I see a counselor once a month whose focus is with families dealing with concerns related to aging and spirituality.

Two things: With God's grace, it's important to keep a sense of humor in the midst of these challenges. And ~ Dennis truly loves coming to church at Immanuel: he looks forward to the music, warm friendships and cookies!
