A Message from Pr. MaryBeth

COURAGE

As followers of Christ, what kind of courage do we need to follow Jesus? Courage is the sum of so many things: valor, instinct, determination, tenacity, daring, even a little fear; courage also requires generosity and compassion.

At its core, I am certain, that courage is about life and hope. Sometimes courage sees danger coming a long way off, that has plenty of time to choose an alternative path, yet decides to stay the course, to remain faithful, to endure the mounting fear in order to do one's duty. It is this kind of courage we see in Jesus, on that first Palm Sunday, as he dared to oppose the imperial Roman occupation by leading a procession into Jerusalem.

My Mexican-American family and friends are living on edge: fearful of going to work, to the grocery store, to drop-off and pick-up their children at school. As unbelievable as it sounds, our Christian sisters and brothers are being targeted for their brown skin, speaking with an accent. Many are US citizens: born here or immigrants; some are



permanent legal residents, others are granted asylum (like the Venezuelans we assisted last year). To make this more personal, my daughter is half-Mexican, born in Chicago, lives in Logan Square and walks to work with great caution as ICE is always nearby.

As followers of Christ, what kind of courage do we need to follow Jesus? Jesus rode in the face of fear, animosity and deceit. He rode for the radical concepts of peace, reconciliation and truth. As Christians, we are encouraged to embrace the kind of courage that stays the course toward hospitality, kindness, healing and forgiveness.

The church, this Immanuel church, is called to embrace the kind of courage we see in Jesus. A courage that is generous and compassionate, that, at its core, is about life and hope.



It's getting dark around 6 p.m., the temperatures are crisper and the leaves are turning — signs that we are about to fall back. Here's what to know about the end of daylight saving time 2025.

Many countries around the world and most of the U.S. still turn the clocks forward or backward an hour, in the effort to extend daylight hours seasonally, though some argue the practice should be brought to an end. Pennsylvania legislature has advanced bills in recent years to keep daylight saving permanent, but no action has been taken.

The difference is DST would mean later sunrises and sunsets, allowing for more time for outdoor activities after work in the evenings, whereas standard time would mean earlier sunrises and sunsets, which some argue increase safety in the mornings for school children and is more in line with our biological circadian rhythms, according to save standard time. DST is approximately eight months, starting on the second Sunday of March and ending on the first Sunday of November, according to the Uniform Time Act of 1966.

Daylight saving time is not being discontinued in the United States as of now. However, there are discussions around making it permanent. While some states have passed bills for year-round daylight saving time, any changes require federal action. Thus until such legislation is passed, the time changes will continue to occur.

Clocks will fall back one hour on Sunday, November 2, 2025 at 2:00am as Daylight Saving Time ends across most of the United States.

This change will result in an extra hour of sleep for many.
